What's the Buzz?

On Saturday, June 15, a neighbor and former board officer contacted the Civic Association to inform of a bee swarm that had formed on Pennsboro Drive. Board President Ken Lee contacted the Capital Area Beekeepers Association and within a week they sent back a photo of the bees' new habitat! They have been named the "Pennsboro Swarm." Bee removal specialists know how to relocate bees without harming them and can prevent them from returning to a yard. Bee swarming season in Pennsylvania is from May to June and most species of bees in the state nest in the ground or in wood.



You can help wild bee populations by planting available food sources yearround, providing nesting habitat, and reducing pesticide use. Conserving bee biodiversity helps preserve critical pollination services. Hornets, yellow jackets, and wasps can produce painful stings but most wild bees are not aggressive. Some tips to help prevent bee stings include staying away, moving slowly, carefully picking up items on the ground, and taking precautions if you are allergic. Remember that bee keepers wear protective gear to handle them!

2024 Street Resurfacing Project Notice

Westover East is scheduled to be resurfaced September 3 to September 6. Motorists should expect modified traffic patterns which will be controlled by certified flaggers to ensure safety. There may be limited local road closures at times, however access to developments and properties will be maintained throughout the project. Mail delivery, trash, school bus, and emergency services will not be disrupted. The contractor will use message boards and issue notices to residents regarding the project schedule, on-street parking restrictions and temporary road closures. The Township and Pennsy Supply request that residents comply with parking restrictions and make every effort to use off street parking during construction. Additionally, trash/recycling bins and temporary basketball backboards should not be placed in the roadway once notice of a paving schedule and parking restriction are posted on a specific street. These efforts will expedite resurfacing of the streets and help limit any inconvenience the project may cause. When feasible, motorists are strongly encouraged to avoid the project areas while work is on-going. If a motorist notices paving material on their car, after traveling through the project area, they are encouraged to wash the car as soon as possible to remove the material. <u>Click here to find Township updates on this project.</u>

Creating a Tick Resistant Garden

These tips were published 5 years ago in the newsletter, but we get good feedback when we include outdoor care tips so we are sharing this article again! Westover Zone Director and resident Anella Nickolas, who is also a Master Gardener, contributed these tips. According to the CDC, Pennsylvania leads the nation in Lyme disease cases. Climate change is changing the seasonal temperatures to extend the seasons where ticks are active in PA. There is also a great graphic at this link with zones of tick prevention for your home. You may question some of the tips about deer, but we've heard from morning runners that they see deer in Westover at dawn; maybe you've seen them in your yard or on a motion camera.

Landscape changes you can make in order to keep your property as close to a tick-free habitat as possible:

- •Restrict areas where deer, rodents and ticks are common, such as forest and brush. Make them off-limits for family activities.
- •Create a three-foot barrier of woodchips or rock to separate the off-limits area from the lawn.
- •Keep woodpiles away from the home, or site them on the woodchip barrier.
- •Remove leaf litter.
- •Create a tick-safe zone, a nine-foot barrier of lawn between the woodchips and patios, gardens, and play sets.
- •Create open, sunny areas by pruning trees to let in more sunlight.
- •Place play sets in sunny areas.
- •Keep lawns mowed.
- •Trim shrubs near walks and patios.
- •Remove groundcover around trees.
- •Surround gardens with fieldstone, gravel or lawn paths.
- •Construct an eight-foot-high fence to keep deer out. (*Fences require permits in our Township*)
- •Select deer-resistant plants for your landscape.
- •Remove exotic-invasive species that deer love to browse, such as Japanese barberry (Berberis thunbergii).

REMINDER: Obey Traffic Signs

The SPEED LIMIT ON SKYPORT is 35 MPH. In WESTOVER, SPEED LIMITS are 20 and 25 MPH. Neighbors continue to voice concern about vehicles speeding through Westover. Dogs, kids, runners, walkers, contractors, and unexpected objects can appear quickly. Turning in from Skyport Road can be a cue to slow your speed. Be mindful of stopping at ALL STOP SIGNS within Westover. Pedestrians have responsibilities as well and should do their part to stay visible, use established sidewalks, or stay as close to the curb on the road as possible.




Commons Knowledge

With new families moving in over the past several months, the Civic Association has received inquiries about the Commons. Westover Commons is a 10 acre passive park owned and managed by Hampden Township. It includes what Westover residents often refer to as McCord Commons and the Lower Commons. The Commons is a Westover treasure of undeveloped land that provides a great area for walking, birdwatching, and leisure use. Amenities include benches, trails, and Conodoguinet Creek access. McCord Commons includes a .287 mile paved loop walking path.

Many of our beloved annual activities take place at the Commons. On a given day, you will find someone enjoying the time and space of the Commons—perhaps yourself! Civic Association dues also contribute to the upkeep and maintenance of the Commons above what the Township provides. Volunteer work days are essential in the Spring and Fall to preserve the appeal of the park.

I hope you and your gram enjoy learning more about birds through the app! Thanks to our friends at Cornell Lab for sparking more interest in the life of birds! The app is powered by billions of observations shared by people around the world contributing to the database.
